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
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
The Adventure Begins

Genesis 1




The big black space stretched through empty darkness. Then God created light that even the blackest night could not contain. All in one day. The very first day.

Adam and Eve Sin


Genesis 2:15 - 17; Genesis 3

Genesis 6 - 9



Noah looked forward to the day when he would walk on steady ground again and see horses gallop across golden fields, monkeys leap from tree to tree, and turtles meander through the green grass.




"Thank you, God," said Noah, clasping his rough, worn hands together. "Thank you for promising to save me, my family, and these animals."




Joseph was trapped for hours before he heard something hit the ground — a rope. "At last, they've come back," he sighed with relief.

Miriam ran home with a smile on her face. She couldn't wait to tell her mother the wonderful news. Her precious baby brother had been saved by the princess of Egypt!




The Plagues



Exodus 14




Moses took a deep breath.




God told them how. It didn't make sense to them, but Joshua and God's people obeyed. For six days the people marched one time around the city walls of Jericho and then returned to their camp.

Samson led the people of Israel for twenty years. But Samson did not always follow the rules. And he made friends with the wrong people.




One time he fell in love with a crafty woman named Delilah. She made Samson tell her the secret of his strength. What a big mistake!

Psalm 23:1 The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want.


Psalm 23:2 He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters,

Proverbs 3:3 Don't let love and truth ever leave you. Tie them around your neck. Write them on the tablet of your heart.

Proverbs 3:5 Trust in the Lord with all your heart. Do not depend on your own understanding.

Proverbs 3:25 Don't be terrified by sudden trouble. Don't be afraid when sinners are destroyed.

Proverbs 3:26 The Lord is the one you will trust in.

Proverbs 10:12 Hate stirs up fights. But love erases all sins by forgiving them.

Proverbs 12:25 Worry makes a man's heart heavy. But a kind word cheers him up.

Proverbs 12:26 Godly people are careful about the friends they choose. But the way of sinners leads them down the wrong path.

Proverbs 15:1 A gentle answer turns anger away. But mean words stir up anger.

Proverbs 16:3 Commit to the Lord everything you do. Then your plans will succeed.


Proverbs 19:17 Anyone who is kind to poor people lends to the Lord. God will reward him for what he has done.

With hope Naaman went to see the prophet of God, Elisha. Naaman knocked, but no one came to the door. Not even after he made it clear that he was an important commander.


Finally a servant arrived with a message from Elisha: Go into the Jordan River and dip in it seven times. Then you will be healed.

They looked into her eyes. "Mordecai wants you to know that there is trouble ahead."


"Tell me more," she said.

Then the king appointed Mordecai as his new advisor. Through Esther and Mordecai, the Jewish people were saved!




Drooling Lions

Instead Daniel saw something he didn't expect. He blinked several times. There it was — over in the corner. An angel of the Lord. The wild beasts turned away from Daniel.


Even though it was dark, the angel who guarded him knew right where he was.

Jonah 1 – 4




Jonah picked a fishbone out of his hair and looked around. He couldn't see anything, but he could feel the clumps of seaweed sloshing past him in the water.

Luke 2:1 - 7




The world was silent. And most everyone was fast asleep. What seemed like a normal night, with the moon and the stars shining brightly overhead, would become a night like no other.

They found baby Jesus and praised God. The Savior of the world had come!




Gifts from the Wise Men

A voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, and I love him. I am very pleased with him."




Jesus left the river and went into the desert to fast and to pray for forty days.

Jesus answered, "It is also written, 'Don't put the Lord your God to the test' " (Deuteronomy 6:16). Jesus had passed the second test.




Then Jesus stood on a very high mountain. The Devil showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory. "If you bow down and worship


Jesus waved to the fishermen in the boats. "Come. Follow me!" he called.

Matthew 6:25 - 34




Crowds of people followed Jesus. They wanted to hear him teach. So he went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples were there too.

Beautiful flowers dotted the hillside. Their delicate petals fluttered in the wind. And they smelled as sweet as perfume.




"And why do you worry about clothes?" said Jesus. "See how the wildflowers grow. They don't work or make clothing."

Jesus rubbed his eyes. Just moments ago he had been sleeping in the boat, unaware of the change in the weather.




Frightened, the disciples clung with all their might to the sides of the boat. But not Jesus. He stood up and simply said to the storm, "Be still!"


Jesus turned around as the man approached. "Jesus," the man called out. "Jesus, please help. My daughter is very sick," he said as he bent down to catch his breath.




Jesus spit on the ground to dampen the dirt. Then he put the mud on the man's eyes. He told the man to wash in the Pool of Siloam.


He had wanted to see other places, so he had boldly demanded that his father give him his inheritance money.

So the man left the city and found the best job he could, feeding pigs at a farm. And there he sat in the mud with the smelly animals.



The man got up from the pigpen and walked home. Before he even reached his house, he saw someone running down the road toward him. It was his father!



John 11:1 - 44




Jesus stood at the entrance of the tomb and called, "Come out!"

The sisters held their breath. The bandages fell off. It was ...




Lazarus! His sisters ran to him and hugged him, cobwebs and all. They wouldn't let go.




A Friendship Is Lost




On the walk to Golgotha, "the place of the skull," Jesus carried a heavy, wooden cross on his bleeding back. Each step was a painful struggle.

Then the angel said, "Go! Tell his disciples and Peter, 'Jesus is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him. It will be just as he told you.' "




Heaven Bound

Acts 1:1 - 11






Then as the disciples watched, Jesus was taken up to heaven. Soon a cloud hid Jesus from their sight.

About three thousand people joined the believers that day!




Jail Quake

The guard thought everyone had escaped. He trembled with fear because he would be punished if he didn't do his job. But Paul called out to him, "Don't worry. We are all here!"


Scared and amazed, the jailer rushed into the cell. He fell down at the feet of Paul and Silas and asked, "What must I do to be saved?"
